SECOND TIME'S A CHARM FOR CAMAS



On January 4, 2023, Doug Quinn will start his role as the new City Administrator for the City of Camas.

To say it's been a journey for the City to get to this point is an understatement. Since the early departure of former City Administrator Jamal Fox, Camas has seen two different mayors and a few individuals roll off Council, with new ones added on. In that time the City also conducted two searches to fill the Administrator role; however, neither came to fruition. Fast forward to early December and in a fortuitous turn of events, Camas Mayor Steve Hogan announced that Doug Quinn would be the next City Administrator for the City of Camas.

Quinn had applied in the second round of the process, which he said provided him with time to really consider his decision.

"This wasn't the easiest decision at first. I've worked at Clark Public Utilities for almost 20 years, and in that time adopted a deep commitment to my co-workers and the organizational values," said Quinn.

"It has been rewarding and enlightening and the thought of leaving them at that point was compelling enough to keep me there."

Even though Quinn was feeling the pull to stay with Clark PUD, outside influences can also weigh heavily on an individual. And so, as the first round passed without a candidate, more and more individuals reached out to Quinn with a suggestion...why not you?

"Later, during the second round, I was approached more directly by community members to consider reengaging with the city," said Quinn. "And, after reconsidering myself, it was an easier decision at the time and one that I'm enthusiastic about."

For those who know Quinn, his decision makes sense. Since 1988, Camas has been home for Doug, his wife Christy and their three children.

In that time in the community, Doug and his wife have been very intentional about supporting the things they value, which resulted in a lifetime of activity around Camas schools, the City, downtown, and businesses.



In addition to his numerous community service positions, Quinn has served on the Camas School Board since 2005, and as Board President from 2009-2011 and 2017-2019. He's also been a Board Member with the Downtown Camas Association since 2005.

"I have a view of Camas that spans about 35 years, and I have seen it change over that time," he said. "Our shared history is relevant to our future, and I believe our City should pursue that which it values. That, to me, is best accomplished by working with the mayor, Council and City employees."

It helps that Quinn isn't a stranger to the inner workings of the City. .

He served as Planning Director and Assistant City Engineer from 1988 to 1990, Public Works Director and City Engineer from 1990 to 2003, and Interim City Administrator from 1998 to 1999. During that time, Quinn and current Mayor Steve Hogan got to know each other well and Hogan was able to see that dedication in practice.

"Doug is extremely well-known and respected in this community, but it's his dedication to this City that really made him the clear choice," said Hogan. "I think his familiarity with the City of Camas and his knowledge of the area will be extremely beneficial," he said.

Taking over at a City that has seen some turnover would be a unique challenge for anyone; add in the rapid growth Camas has been experiencing and it's easy to see that Quinn will have as much work as he's ready to handle. But handle it is exactly what he plans to do and for that to occur, he'll need to hit the ground running. In his first 100 days, Quinn said his focus will mostly fall inward.

"My goal is to focus on the existing organizational issues, priorities, and people," he said.



"I am invested in the success of the City agency and, by extension, the success of individual employees and the leadership team."

But that's not all he has on the docket. According to Quinn, his applied daily practice will also include listening and exploring, in order to familiarize himself with the current City culture. He also plans to meet with every department and, ideally, every staff member.

Perhaps most important of all though, Quinn said he will continue to support open and transparent access for all to the workings and decisions of the City.

MEET COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR ALAN PETERS

Q&A with Alan Peters, Camas Community Development Director

Alan Peters began his new role as Community Development Director Dec. 5. The Community Development Department is comprised of three divisions: the Planning Division, the Development Engineering Division and the Building Division. While the work has been a little different each place I've worked, I've consistently enjoyed serving and engaging with the public in each of these roles.

Q. You came from Skamania County. Are there any accomplishments that you're really proud of?

Q. How many years do you have in the industry?

A. I've worked in various roles in community development for almost 12 years, mostly in the public sector. I started my planning career working for Provo, Utah, a mid-sized city that was undergoing a lot of redevelopment at the time, and in particular was seeing a lot of new activity in its historic downtown core. My next role was for a Salt Lake City suburb that was developing at a rapid pace, so I got to work on an interesting mix of large-scale commercial, industrial, residential, and public projects.

Most recently, I spent seven years in Skamania County, where I focused more on environmental planning issues and developed partnerships with state and federal agencies, including the Columbia River Gorge Commission. A. In 2021, I had the opportunity to lead the creation of a new standalone Community Development Department that included planning, building, fire marshal, and environmental health. In this shift, we focused on becoming an organization that was known for providing excellent customer service.

I'm also proud of leading our department through the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and then through two subsequent years of record high development activity in the county.

Throughout my time with Skamania County, I managed several major longrange planning projects, including the development of a new critical areas ordinance and Shoreline Master Program, a major update to our development regulations for the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area, and the zoning of more than 10,000 acres of land.

MEET COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR ALAN PETERS

Q. What made you interested in this position?

A. I live in Camas and love this community and saw this position as a unique opportunity to take my professional experience and apply it to benefit a place I'm deeply committed to. Our City is growing a lot, and with this growth comes the challenge of maintaining our unique sense of place and ensuring that our kids can afford to live here too. I also knew that the City has a great council and professional staff and knew this was a team I wanted to be a part of.

Q. What is a typical day like in Community Development?

A. Right now, I'm focused on relationship building and listening, so my days have been mostly filled with meetings with staff, elected officials, and community members. Our department provides our customers guidance and assistance throughout the building- and project-review process, so a typical day involves reviewing project plans, conducting inspections, preparing for public hearings, and meeting with residents, builders, and developers about ongoing projects. We also consistently look for ways we can strengthen our regulations and improve our processes.

Q. What are you most looking forward to working on in Camas?

A. We have two exciting projects on the horizon that our community has also been looking forward to.

First, a periodic update to our Citywide Comprehensive Plan and second, our first subarea plan for Downtown Camas. With all the growth happening in Camas, strengthening our downtown will be key in maintaining our unique smalltown feel.

Q. What do you enjoy about living in Camas?

A. First, I love my neighborhood and my neighbors. Second, I like the mix of developed areas, parks, trails, and open spaces throughout the community. Third, I enjoy spending time in our downtown. I have a toddler, so right now we enjoy craft and story time at Bookish, finding new toys at Periwinkle's, and grabbing pizza at Camas Slices. We also love spending time at the library.

Everett Street Corridor Analysis Project

In August 2022, the City of Camas and its consultant team began evaluating the Everett Street Corridor from NE Lake Road to the northerly City limits near NE 3rd Street (not to be confused with NE 3rd Avenue, which runs through downtown).

Our purpose is to analyze the corridor using public input, data, and technical guidance to develop an improvement plan for providing safe, efficient passage and access for all. We will use the input, data, and guidance to develop design concepts for consideration, select one design concept (called a "preferred alternative"), and begin developing the preferred concept into a design plan. Your input is essential to defining the needs of the community – thank you for participating.

Our next step will be to review all the data collected from technical folks and the public, and work with the Technical Advisory Committee to develop a range of options based on the data collected for further exploration with the public.

Nakia Creek Fire

The City continues to coordinate with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) on the impacts from the Nakia Creek Fire. Once the emergency team from the Oregon Department of Fire left the site, it was up to DNR to continue monitoring the area, work with property owners that were impacted, and begin restoring the area to the extent practicable.

That includes DNR's coordination with the City of Camas on the approximately 800+ acres of City-owned forestland that was impacted by the fire.

In addition to working with DNR, City staff has been working to identify the potential for an immediate harvest of the areas impacted. There is still significant monetary value from the trees that were partially burned, but only if they can be harvested within the next year.

If the trees can't be harvested that soon, they will quickly become a liability for the City. Not only will the City not recognize any returns, but the area will become more likely to burn again.

Reforestation would also be much more difficult as less ground will be available to replant due to all the standing dead trees. Likewise, trying to contract to log the area later would ultimately cost the City, as there would be little-to-no-value in the lumber. For these reasons, it's vital that we try and move quickly. Our partners at DNR and Weyerhaeuser are trying to act just as quickly on the large areas of their properties that also burned.

Continued protection and appropriate management of the City's Jones and Boulder Creek Watersheds is vital for the environment and the ability to bring safe drinking water to the City.



KEEP CALM AND SKATE ON

If you will, flash back to the year 2000. At that time, the U.S. population topped 282 million. Everyone realized Y2K wasn't as scary as had been predicted. And in a small mill town in Southwest Washington, City leaders were working on a skatepark.

The cities of Camas and Washougal decided to work together to provide local youth with a park they could spend hours at, honing their craft, or just having a good time.

To make the park appealing, City staff worked with local skaters on the design, which ultimately resulted in a park that simulated the street style that they were used to. Enter the Camas/Washougal Skatepark.

Completed in 2002, the skate park that was once cutting edge has now been in service for 20 years. In 2017, local resident Tim Laidlaw saw a park that no longer fit the needs of the current skate community. Some features had been removed and the remaining ones were outdated and considered too difficult and awkward for the skaters of today.



Laidlaw decided to do something about that and began working with Riverside Bowl, a group made up of skaters and residents, to help revitalize the skatepark area by volunteering to clean the park and advocating for updates to the park.

That work recently paid off as the skatepark improvement project was prioritized as a capital improvement project by the City of Camas.

This skatepark renovation project was a community driven project in 2017 and continues to be community driven in 2022. In 2018, prior to the pandemic, the Cities of Camas and Washougal initiated an effort to update park design and construct new features.

Energy around the project grew in 2019 with a successful skateboarding demonstration and fundraising event driven by the community, as well as local businesses and organizations. In 2020, due to the pandemic, the project was placed on hold.

"Now in 2022, with the support of the community and our non-profit partners Camas Parks Foundation and Parks Foundation of Clark County, the City of Camas is once again moving the project forward.

On December 5, 2022, Council approved the awarding of the low bid to construct the new park improvements to Lee Contractors. Unfortunately, with this restart, the City of Washougal will not be partnering financially on the project.

"The Camas Parks Foundation is thrilled to be able to support the upcoming renovations at our skatepark. This fundraising success is thanks to a small but mighty group of community members who are passionate about this park, skateboarding, and providing safe, outdoor recreation for our local youth," said Camas Parks Foundation Member, Cassi Marshall.

"We are especially grateful to the City of Camas and Parks Commission for supporting this project, the Riverside Bowl group for their constant advocacy, and the C-W Community Chest and the Norm Danielson Foundation for their generous contributions," she said.



The new 2022 design provides features for skaters of all skill levels, including elements for beginner to advance skaters.

Beginners can start learning tricks on the new funbox and quarter pipe that's added to the existing loading dock at the southwest end of the park; intermediate skaters can hone their skills with the added entry pyramid and quarter pipe with deck; and advanced skaters can enjoy a new bowl added at the northeast end of the park.

The renovated skatepark should be ready for skaters before Summer 2023.
