Earlier I discussed our abundance of water, and as you probably know, one area we're focused on is the water quality in our lakes. Over the past year, we've been testing water samples and looking at plant life along the shoreline.

Now, we're ready to present the next steps in our Lake Management Plan. Be sure to join us July 12, at the Lacamas Lake Lodge 6 -7:30 p.m., for an open house to hear what we've learned about the water in Fallen Leaf, Lacamas, and Round Lakes, and get a first look at the draft Lake Management Plan and solutions being proposed to improve water quality.

This year also marked a momentous occasion; we welcomed members from our Polish Sister Cities program to Camas in April. Representatives from the Polish cities of, Krapkowice, Morawica, and Zabierzow, and the Opole Province, as well as other European dignitaries, visited Camas to meet with elected officials and staff, tour the City, and learn more about their American counterparts. AVISIT WITH CAMAS' SISTER CITIES



In the realm of Sister Cities, where camaraderie replaces sibling rivalry, the bond between Camas and its Polish counterparts was showcased in full glory this past April. Dignitaries from various cities, including Poland Slovakia, and Ukraine, embarked on a journey to Camas, eager to explore the Democratic essence of their American sibling.

The delegation comprised thirteen esteemed individuals, representing a diverse range of positions and locations, and included: Mr. Marian Buras – Mayor – Morawica, Poland Ms. Alina Buras – Supporter – Morawica, Poland Mr. Andrzej Kasiura – Mayor – Krapkowice, Poland Ms. Zuzanna Donath-Kasiura – Deputy Marshal – Opole Province, Poland Ms. Elzbieta Burtan – Mayor – Zabierzow, Poland Mr. Henryk Kraczyk – Council Chair – Zabierzow, Poland Ms. Aleksandra Malek – Cultural Center Director – Zabierzow, Poland

From Poland to Ukraine, these visitors hailed from different corners of Europe with the goal to foster cultural exchange and understanding. Their collective aim was to gain insight into Camas' democratic government, a political structure that emerged in Poland after the country's transition from communism in 1989, followed by a full parliamentary system in 1997, leaving behind the remnants of socialism.

To achieve their objective, the dignitaries embarked on a comprehensive itinerary across various cities in western Washington. Renton, Seattle, Tukwila, Washougal, and others opened their doors to these international guests, providing glimpses into their own governance systems.



The culmination of their visit arrived when three delegation members took center stage as keynote speakers at the Pacific Northwest Regional Council (PNRC) National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials meeting in Portland.

These trips generally occur every four to five years and alternate between Polish visitors coming to Camas and Camas residents traveling to Poland. While the primary focus lies in sharing knowledge about democratic governance, Camas elected officials have found themselves on the receiving end of valuable lessons as well.

Mayor Steve Hogan expressed his enthusiasm, emphasizing the mutual exchange of perspectives.

"These visits are always fascinating because, in addition to showcasing our practices, we gain fresh insights from their unique business conduct in Poland," he said.

Mayor Hogan acknowledged the significance of these connections, emphasizing the importance of recognizing and honoring the bonds forged between the local communities and foreign governments.



He extended his gratitude to Lloyd Halverson, former Camas City Administrator, who played an instrumental role in facilitating the Sister Cities organization and ensuring the success of the visit.

While the recent visit welcomed representatives from Poland, Camas also boasts sister cities in Japan, adding another layer of international collaboration. Although there are currently no discussions about potential visits from their Japanese counterparts, Mayor Hogan expressed the City's eagerness to seize such opportunities should they arise.

Overall, the visit by dignitaries from Camas' Polish Sister Cities organization exemplified the spirit of camaraderie and cultural exchange that defines these international relationships. As borders blurred and knowledge flowed, the bonds between nations grew stronger, fostering a global community based on mutual understanding and shared experiences.



FUNDING THE FUTURE

Money, money, money. It's a common topic of conversation at the City level. Whether it's capital projects, hiring more staff, or providing amenities for the community, it all takes an abundance of one thing...money.

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As such, many cities are often looking for ways to help offset those costs; and the City of Camas is no exception. The City continuously looks for potential grants and other funding opportunities to lessen the financial burden when trying to construct new projects. Traditionally, the City has been very successful in this endeavor, including working with local state and federal legislators in requesting direct appropriations.

As such, prior to the legislative session, or applying for grants, staff looks for realistic projects that will appeal to state and federal partners, projects that are ready to proceed, and projects they know can be delivered on.

Which is why the recent news of successful grants and a helping hand from the state legislature in terms of monetary funds for City projects is something to get excited about.

In total, the City of Camas received close to \$3 million from a combination of grants and state funds. With that being said, that money is divided among the Library, Parks & Recreation, and Public Works.

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In addition, the money does not come without caveats, the main one being that the City of Camas will match that amount for the selected projects as well.

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The Camas Public Library, which is celebrating 100 years this year, received \$730,000 as a matching grant from the Department of Commerce's Library Capital Improvement Program, pushing the total project funding amount to \$1.46 million. That money has been earmarked for interior improvements such as the new "Bee Hive Learning Center" and exterior improvements around the Library, including accessibility and safety updates, with one example being the replacement of the exterior doors at each entrance.

However, not every project is equal in the eyes of the grantors. Library Director Connie Urquhart said her team determined which project to submit for the grant through a combination of factors.

"An older building like ours has many areas that need attention," said Urquhart. "When applying for capital grants, proposals which seek to mitigate accessibility and life safety issues tend to be more successful than more cosmetic ones."

The Camas Parks & Recreation Department also received significant funding through the state grant process, with a total of \$1.75 million from the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program.

FUNDING THE FUTURE

Of this amount, \$500,000 will be used for the upcoming Crown Park construction, while the other \$1.25 million will be used as reimbursement for the Green Mountain acquisition completed in 2020.

Parks Director Trang Lam said this year things were slightly different as there seemed to be more funds available.

"WWRP grants this legislative session were unprecedented," said Lam. "This is the first time the available grant funds peaked over \$100 million, with total funding reaching the \$120 million mark."

Lam said the key to their success this year was project timing, readiness, and competitiveness.

Not to be outdone, the Public Works Department also received money for the Lake Management Plan. A total of \$515,000 in State Capital Budget appropriations will be matched by the City to continue the process of implementing strategies to improve the water quality in Fallen Leaf, Lacamas, and Round Lakes.

Public Works Director Steve Wall said Senator Lynda Wilson and Representatives Paul Harris and Kevin Waters should get recognized for spearheading the Lake Management Plan request.

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"With limited funding, the City only brings forward projects that will support the broader community and are of great need that we feel can be supported and delivered," said Wall. "That's why we were excited to have the support of our local legislators on this important community project."

Ultimately, there is no secret formula that guarantees success. It takes a lot of time and effort to apply for grants and low interest loans as the programs are typically very competitive.

Likewise, it takes a lot of City representatives time and energy lobbying local legislators for Camas projects and providing all the information required by the local delegation to garner support for our projects.

Beyond the numbers and bureaucratic processes lie the tangible benefits for the community. The improved library facilities, enhanced parks, and cleaner lakes will contribute to the quality of life for Camas residents. These achievements exemplify the city's commitment to providing valuable resources and amenities, making Camas an even better place to call home.

In the end, the hard work paid off for Camas, and the residents will soon reap the rewards for that hard work.

Riverside Bowl Skate Park Grand Reopening – Save the Date!

We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to the numerous community advocates, the dedicated design team, and the generous fundraising efforts that have propelled us towards securing support, funding, and approval from the City Council, which enabled us to bring this project to life. Your contributions are sincerely appreciated! Skatepark renovations are currently underway, and we are excited to unveil new features just in time for summer. The grand reopening event will take place Thursday, July 27, 4-7 p.m.

In honor of the former Riverside Bowling Alley, which stood next to the skatepark, as well as the grassroots Riverside Bowl skate community and the newly incorporated bowl design at the park, the Parks & Recreation Commission has officially approved the renaming of the park from the Camas-Washougal Skate Park to the Riverside Bowl Skatepark. The new park name will be immortalized through a skatepark mural. Kevin Seagraves, a local Washougal artist, has been selected to create this new mural. You will have the opportunity to meet Kevin and see his mural design during the grand reopening event.

PFAS

The City of Camas has reactivated Well 13. A notice to water customers mailed in January stated that based on sampling completed in 2022, Well 13 had an elevated level of Per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) which were above the State Action Level (SAL) of 15 parts per trillion. In response to this elevated level, Well 13 was turned off in early 2023. Recent testing for Well 13 completed in May did not detect any PFAS, meaning if there was any PFAS they t could not be quantified.

Since the level of PFAS is lower than the SAL (not detected in this instance), the City is not required to send out additional public notification(s); however, the City will continue providing updates to our citizens as new information becomes available or our use of Well 13 changes. The City turned on Well 13 at the end of May and will conduct multiple tests per month over the next quarter to determine if the PFAS returns and to inform future planning. This testing is above any Washington State Department of Health (DOH) requirements, but it's crucial information for both the City and its water users.

Please note, the City has increased PFAS testing in all City wells and will continue to monitor conditions.

In addition to testing, the City continues to research options to treat our drinking water for potential PFAS contamination and plan for future changes in regulation by the EPA and/or DOH. If you have concerns about PFAS in your drinking water, DOH has developed information regarding options to reduce PFAS in your household tap water: https://doh.wa.gov/sites/default/files/2022-10/331-699.pdf.

The DOH has also launched a new PFAS in Drinking Water Data dashboard. The dashboard provides public access to data collected by public water systems under a state board of health rule adopted in 2021. The rule requires more than 2,400 water systems to test for PFAS before December 2025. About one-quarter of the required testing has been completed so far. Results are published on DOH's PFAS data page https://doh.wa.gov/data-and-statisticalreports/washington-tracking-networkwtn/pfas/dashboard.

Construction

HAIL TO THE CHIEF

Following a nationwide search, the City of Camas announced that Tina M. Jones will be the next Chief of the Camas Police Department. With that in mind we sat down with our new Chief to learn a little more about her!

What made you interested in law enforcement?

I have always had a passion for mysteries and had a strong sense of the importance of justice. As a little girl, I was a prolific reader of Nancy Drew mystery books and had a detective agency with my two best friends in 4th grade. I did not initially pursue coursework in criminal justice in college, but once I got on that path, I was fortunate to have several mentors in the profession who encouraged me. I started working in a local jail, then realized I really wanted to be out in the community as a police officer.

What was it about Camas that interested you in this position?

Camas has a unique history that resonates with me as there are a number of parallels in my family's history, including work in a mill and orchards. It is a special place that feels like home and the community members are highly engaged.



It is a place where it is obvious the community loves their police and the police love serving their community. This balance is much sought after and not to be taken for granted.

Are there any accomplishments from your time in Portland that you're proud of and would like to highlight?

About twelve years ago, I worked with a team to bring a domestic violence response advocate program to life which is still in existence. This team responds to calls in the field at the request of officers and provides direct services to survivors in their time of need.

I also changed how our communications team responds during major events by organizing a Joint Information Center. This allowed us to collaborate with communication partners throughout the region and get more timely information to the media and public during major events to increase safety and awareness. In every assignment, I strive to improve systems and processes to increase safety and efficiency for my team and the community.

What are you looking forward to the most when you arrive in Camas?

I am most looking forward to getting to know my new team, the community, other City employees, and regional partners. I am a very relationship-oriented person and find it rewarding to get to know people and learn about their passions and strengths. I enjoy collaborating with others and identifying creative solutions to problems; I have found there is a lot of power in relationships to overcome obstacles.

Any goals for your first 6 months on the job?

First and foremost, taking time to get to know my team, community members, other City employees, and regional partners is a priority. Retention of our team members and identifying strategies for recruitment is also important to me. Gathering information and assessing where there are immediate needs and identifying strategies to address challenges is also key.

Anything else you'd like to add?

I am very excited to join the Camas Police Department, which is comprised of a phenomenal team committed to serving the Camas community.

I hope to meet many of you at Camas Days and other community events. On a personal level, I find balance with fishing, RV camping, Pilates, collecting art, gardening, and spending time with my three miniature dachshunds.
