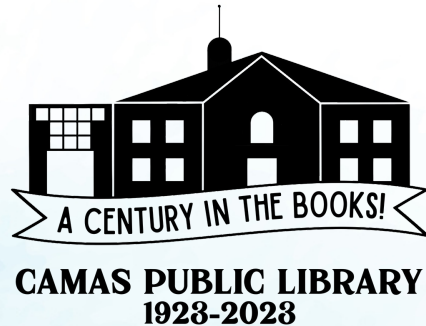

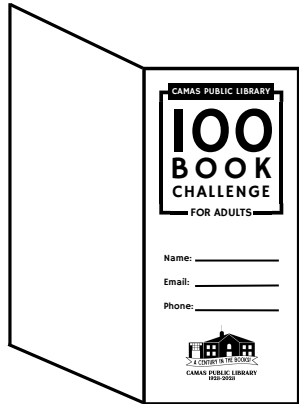

TIMELINE

- **April 4, 1923** - Camas Library Opens!
The collection had 150 State Library books in the space donated by Thayer's drugstore.
- **January 5, 1938** - Camas residents are top readers! Per Washington State Library reports, for the third year in a row, Camas has the highest per capita reading record in the state!
- **May 31, 1940** - Camas City Hall/Library complex at 4th & Franklin opens.
- **January 10, 1948** - First Storytime!
Story hour was first held with 60 children in attendance.
- **January 13, 1981** - Friends of the Camas Public Library incorporated.
- **January 1, 1992** - Online card catalog is installed.
- **January 1, 1994** - The Camas Library receives its first Internet-connected computer.
- **May 10, 2003** - Grand Opening of the renovated and expanded Library.
- **April 4, 2023** - The Library celebrates 100 years!
